## RALLY CLASS BEGINS OCT. 5



If you've heard of Rally but aren't sure how to start, sign up for the Rally class that begins Thursday October 5 at 6 pm. Dogs should be able to walk on a loose leash for 10 ft., sit and down, do a 30 second sit or down stay on leash, and be able to work around other dogs and handlers.

What is Rally? Rally uses Obedience skills on a numbered course similar to an Agility course but instead of obstacles there are Rally exercises. Rally exercises include basic Obedience skills and many signs are based on old Obedience drills. Rally is a great sport for people who are new to dog sports or starting out new dogs because you are permitted unlimited communication with your dog as you run the course and for most exercises you are allowed one re-do. As you move up in levels the courses become longer and more challenging. Novice is all on leash. Advanced is off leash and has a jump. Excellent is off leash, has two jumps, and a sit-stay get your leash exercise. Master is off leash, has one recall over a jump, and you cannot re-do any exercise. There is also an optional Intermediate level between Novice and Advanced which is on leash and uses Advanced signs but not the jump.

#### BRAGS & WAGS

Hanna Kadinger Brewer's Brittanies have done well in Scent Work. Luna finished her AKC Scent Work Detective title. Brooks finished his Scent Work Excellent, Master Buried, and Master Interior titles, earned his first Detective leg and took Excellent High in Trial.

Mary Janek's dogs did well. Willie, Min. Schnauzer, (Warches Willing-N-Able CGC BN) finished his Beginner Novice title with placements for each leg. Armani, Min. Schnauzer, (Warchex Sharp Dressed Man) finished his UKC Championship undefeated with multiple group placements. Surge, Belgian Malinois, (Lynnhaven's Don't Look Now CGC BN RN TKN) finished his Beginner Novice and Rally Novice titles with placements. Touché, Belgian Sheepdog,, (XS The Way You Make Me Feel) finished her UKC Championship w/group placements and a Reserve Best in Show.

Brenda Grice's Lumi, Shetland Sheepdog, took 4th place in Rally Master at our April 28 trial. In June she finished her Scent Work Interior Novice title, got 2 legs in Interior with1st & 2nd places, a leg in Exterior with1st place, and 2 legs in Buried with 2nd & 3rd place.




